
Theology of the Body

- Proceeds by way of careful attention to human experience




Key principles from Theology of the Body

- Affirms the goodness of being human: the person as a unity of body and spirit
- The body reveals the person
- The body speaks a language
 - communication is mediated by the body
- Love: the supreme act of interpersonal communication

Key principles from Theology of the Body

- Love: willing the good of the other; a decision, rather than a sensation
- The opposite of love is not hate, but use
- Key scriptures:
 - ▶ Genesis 1-3
 - Matthew 19
- Christ appeals to "the beginning"
 - Called or accused?




Living the Theology of the Body

- In this life:
 - Complementarity of man and woman
 - Being "for the other"
 - Giving vs. grasping; aspirations vs. inclinations
 - Exclusivity / indissolubility of marriage
 - Fruitfulness of married love
 - Celibacy and marriage: witnesses to one another
- In the life to come:
 - Joining in the exchange of love that is life in the Trinity

Benefits of understanding the Theology of the Body

- Perceiving the Christian vision of what it means to be human helps to reveal our identity
- Once we know who we are (identity), we have insight into how we should live (vocation)
